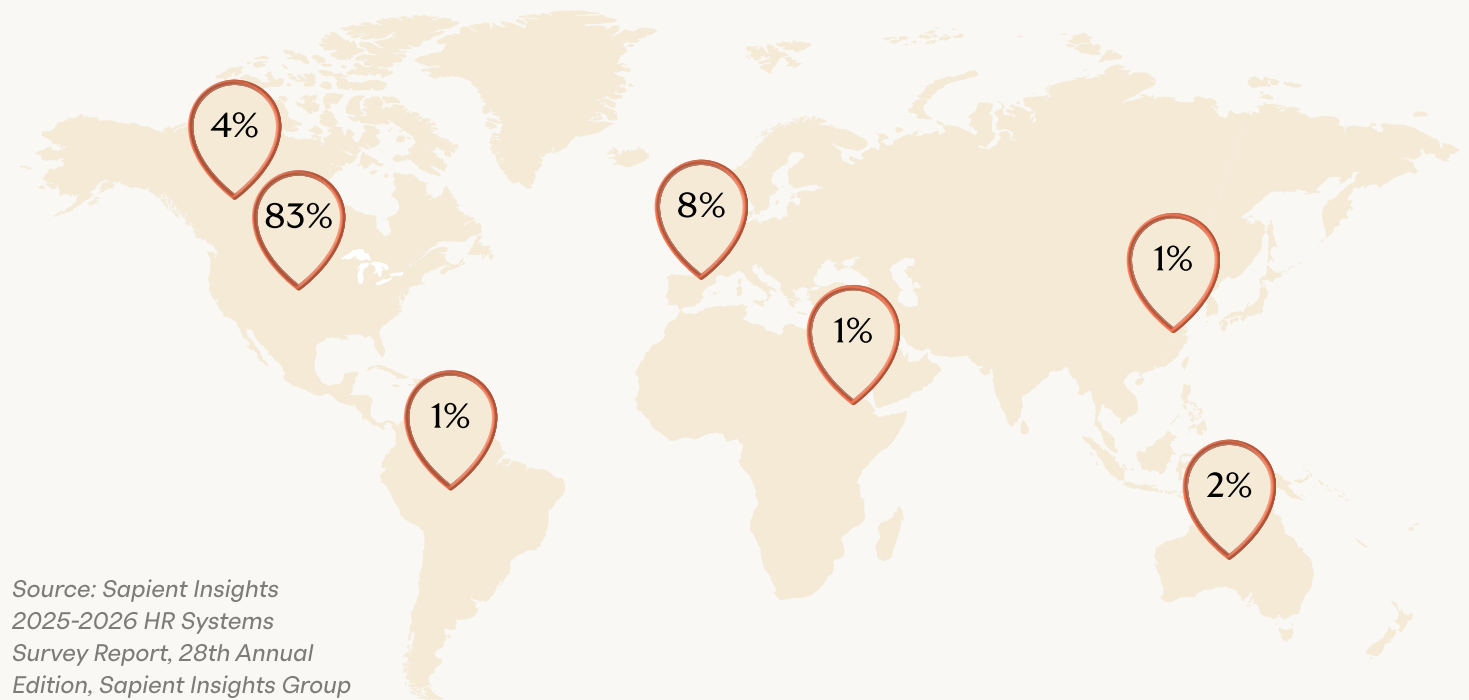

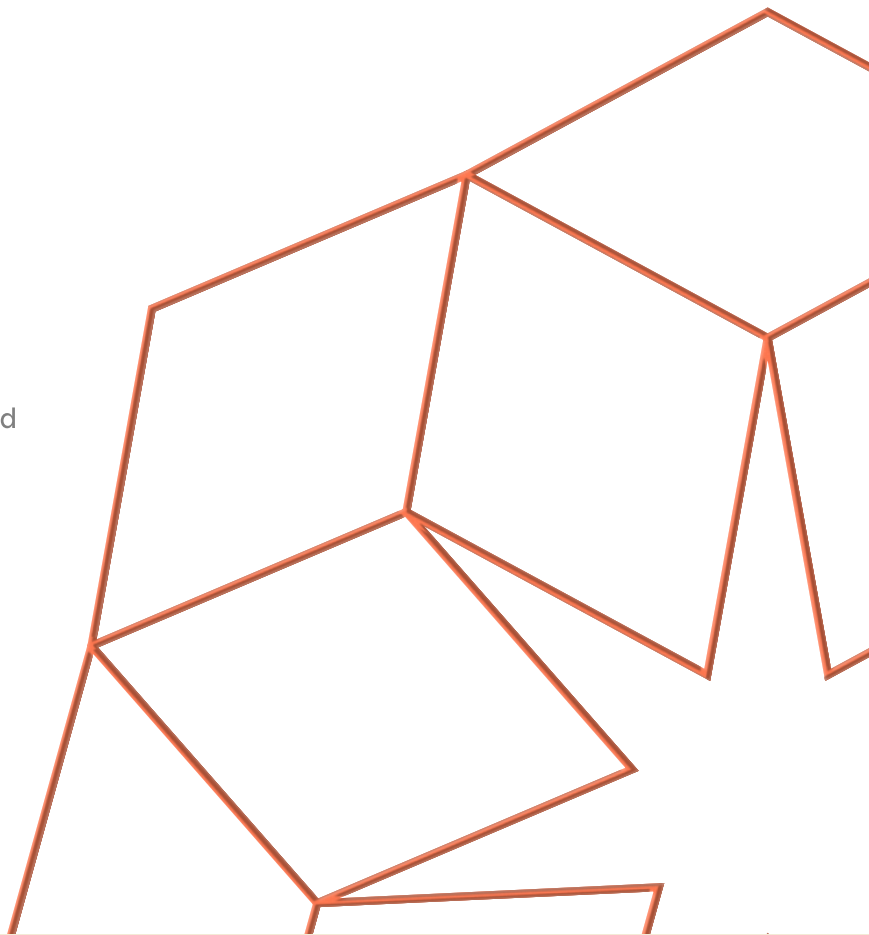
Artificial intelligence is already changing how HR teams work.

- Simplified secondary tools to reduce complexity and improve user experience.

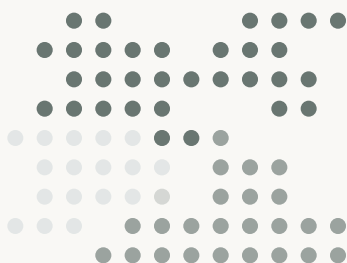

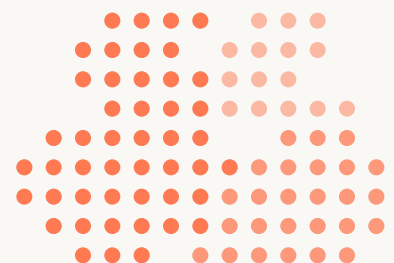

AI delivers the greatest value when it's connected to your workforce data and embedded in your talent workflows. Examples include:

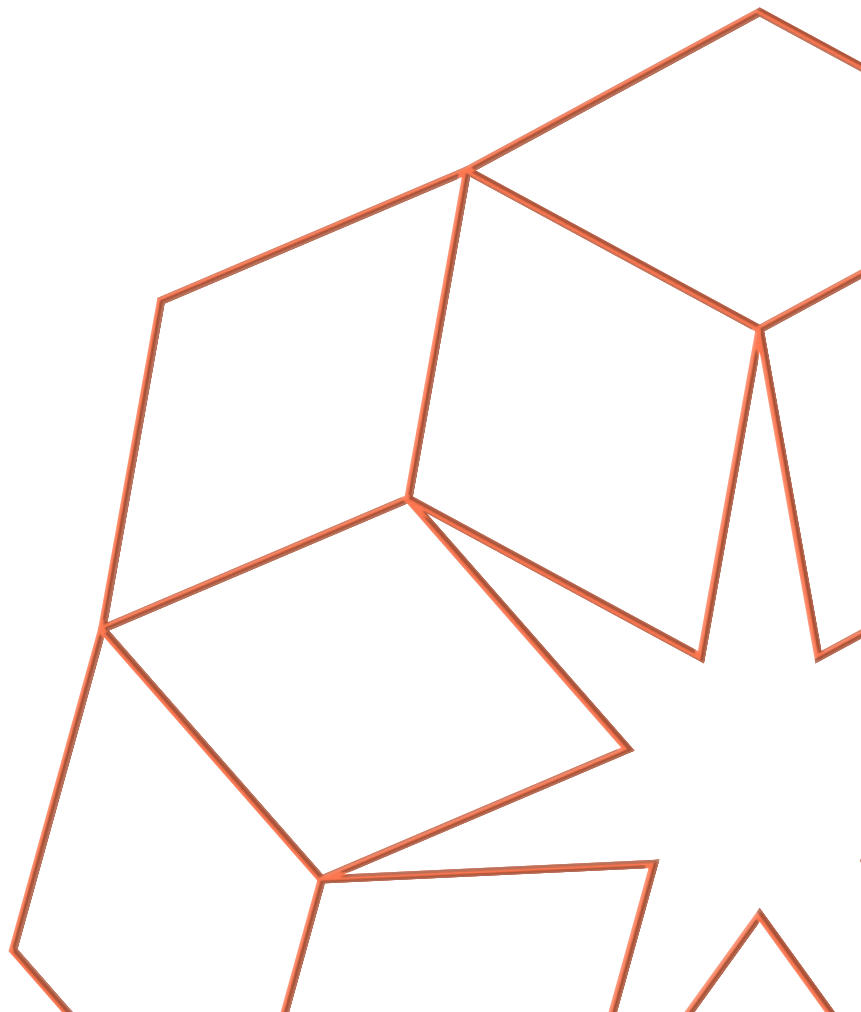
